Entries must be in an official language of the United Nations – Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian or Spanish – that is neither your first language nor the principal language of instruction during your primary or secondary education.



To Enter

You must be a full-time university student and must be 18 years of age or older by **April 15, 2015**. Your participation must be sponsored by a faculty member or authorized representative at the university you are currently attending.
